March Shell Club Meeting Will Be on the 3rd **Sunday of the Month**

The Sanibel-Captiva Shell Club's March meeting will be held on the third Sunday of the month instead of the 2nd because of the Shell Show. The March 15th meeting will be held in the main auditorium at the Sanibel Community House. Activities will begin with the silent auction and refreshments at 1:30 PM. The silent auction will close at 2:00 and the meeting will begin at that time.

This month our guest speaker is J. Bruce Neill, Ph.D., Director of Education, SCCF. The title of his presentation is

> "Improving the Ocean's Future, How Are We Doing?"



J. Bruce Neill earned his Ph.D. in conservation biology from Montana State University. He has conducted research on coral reef biology and sea urchins, and has held positions at colleges, field schools, and the American Museum of Natural History. Neill's true passion

teaching. He and his wife, Evelyn, founded Sanibel Sea School, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, in 2005 to help more people connect with the ocean through meaningful, field-based experiences.

Dr. Neill has been an advocate for finding effective water quality solutions for many years, both as an individual and through his work with the Sanibel-Captiva Chapter of START (Solutions to Avoid Red Tide), now called Coastal Watch. He speaks regularly to community members about the biology of plankton blooms and the ecological, social. and economic implications of our local water quality challenges.

How Our Grant Money Is Used . . .

Each month, *The Junonia* will feature our 2019 grants recipients. Grants are funded by the proceeds of the annual Shell



Show. This month we are featuring Florida Gulf Coast University and the University of South Florida.

Florida Gulf Coast University (\$4,000)

Research on the potential link between coastal nutrients and red tide blooms will be funded with this grant. More specifically, the project will include taking water samples from the Caloosahatchee River, groundwater wells, and several locations along the southwest Florida coast in the Gulf of Mexico. The unique "isotopic" signatures of the water and associated nutrients will be analyzed so that the magnitude and relative importance of different groundwater sources to nutrient inputs along the southwest Florida coast can be quantified.

University of South Florida - Dr. Tobias Grun (\$2,000)

This grant award will go towards the study of the dietary needs of helmet snails in the Gulf of Mexico, which feed almost exclusively on sea urchins (sand dollars in particular). The hypothesis is that helmet snails feed not only on the soft tissue but also the calcareous skeletons of the sand dollars, which is necessary to produce and maintain the massive shells of helmet snails.



Ten Thousand Islands Shelling Field Trip Was a Real Success

Here are my "special" shells from Kice, including an albino Nutmeg, Rose Murex, True Tulip, and Alphabet Cone.

On Feb 10, 2020, a dozen Shell Club members participated in a shelling field trip to the Ten Thousand Islands south of Marco Island. A big thank you goes out to our Field Trip Chair, Susi Butler, for herding all of us shell collectors.

Our hosts were the boat captains and guides of Treasure Seekers Shell Tours. Our large group was divided among three boats and we headed out for a perfect day of shelling. There was a low tide of -1.05 following a Super Snow Moon, the first of four Super Moons in 2020. A super moon is the phenomenon whereby the moon appears particularly large in the sky owing to the coincidence of its closest approach to the earth with a full (or new) moon.

The weather was perfect and the tide was indeed low, exposing a muddy shoreline that extended into the trees. Our Shell Club group collectively was lucky enough to explore three of the Ten Thousand Islands that day.

Immediately upon landing on Kice Island, we were thrilled to see an abundance of diverse shells. Many were the "usual suspects," but I certainly found larger and more excellent examples of shells that I have already collected on Sanibel.

Slippery muddy shorelines with exposed tree stumps made for tricky walking. Good closed-toe water shoes were a must!

We set off with our buckets, our hearts hopeful of finding the "elusive J" as our guide affectionately called the Junonia.

Besides the shells, other creatures made our trip to the Ten Thousand Islands worthwhile. There were osprey nests, many kinds of crabs, a Glossy Ibis, but luckily not too many no-see-ums or mosquitoes!

After four hours of successful shelling, it was time to head back to the boat ramp in Goodland.

We saw dolphins, and if you've ever tried to photograph dolphins behind a boat, you'll know that catching them at

just the right time is a real feat of luck, something I didn't seem to have that day.

All in all, we had a fantastic trip. Some lucky shell seekers even found a Junonia or a Scotch Bonnet. I collected examples of 43 different species and passed over several others that are so common, but alas, no "J" for me.

February Meeting Report and Minutes

The February 9th meeting of the Sanibel-Captiva Shell Club began informally at 1:30 PM with the Silent Auction. The Refreshments Committee provided cold drinks & snacks. During this time people could join the Shell Club or renew their memberships; sign up for field trips; sign up to volunteer at the Shell Show; and, buy craft shells. The silent auction ran for one-half hour, and consisted of a variety of items, including shells, display cases and shell-themed items.

After the silent auction, an oral auction was held for a set of Claire Murray, Sakura "Shells" dinner and salad plates which had been donated by Kelle Covington by way of Diane Thomas, and a cockscomb oyster cluster (*Lopha cristagalli*). Total received from both the silent and oral auctions was \$458.50.

The Shell Club has received many shells from various individuals who are dissolving their collections. Some of

these shells were given as gifts to those who came to the meeting. Guests and new members were invited to introduce themselves.

Club member Meredith Blain presented the program, "Tales of Turks & Caicos: a photographic journey." She talked about where to go shelling, places to visit, and things to do on the islands. Meredith generously provided a number of framed copies of her photos for the door prizes.

Business Meeting Minutes

President Tom Annesley opened the business meeting at the conclusion of the program.

Dorrie Hipschman, Executive Director of the Bailey-Matthews National Shell Museum, announced the opening of the aquarium, planned for March 1st. The six million dollar funding goal for the aquarium was realized at "Under the Sea." This included a donation from the Shell Club that was used to partially sponsor the warm water touch tank.

A number of announcements were made about the upcoming Shell Show. Members were encouraged to help publicize the event by disseminating the flyers found on their chairs.

Karen Turner and Abby DeLoache, kitchen coordinators, asked members to sign up to bring lunch dishes, snacks and baking. The food is provided for exhibitors and day-long volunteers who will be asked to contribute a daily fee of \$5 to cover morning refreshments, snacks and lunch.

Linda Edinburg announced that shell bagging for the Shell Show will take place at Sanibel Congregational UCC on Friday February 14th and Saturday February 15th, beginning at 10 a.m. Shell baggers will meet in the downstairs hall; bring your own lunch.

Fighting Conch Sushi?
